Day 1

Morning

Grainger Market

For over 180 years locals have flocked to Grainger Market for the freshest fruits and vegetables, the expertise of our butchers and fishmongers and to sample some of Newcastle's most authentic food stalls. It's not just food though - Grainger Market has everything from jewellers to shoe shops and toys to electrical shops.

Located in the heart of Newcastle; it is a two-minute walk from Monument Metro station and has entrances on: Grainger Street, Nelson Street, Nun Street and Clayton Street. Take a look on their website for a market map and to check out some of the amazing fresh food and stalls available.

Fenwick Foodhall

The original Fenwicks store itself, Fenwicks is Newcastle's premier department store and spread over five floors, offers some of the finest shopping around. The first floor is entirely devoted to women's fashion, shoes and accessories, including luxury brands such as Mulberry, Burberry, Victoria Beckham, MaxMara and Michael Kors.

Following a multi-million-pound redevelopment the Food Hall now offers exceptional dining experiences alongside an exciting retail offering that showcases the very best regional and international produce. Mason + Rye, Porterhouse Butcher and Grill, Fuego and The Naked Deli, to name a few, is just a small taste of what's on offer at Fenwick Food Hall.

Lunch at Cookhouse

Cook House, recently featured on Channel 4's 'Hidden Restaurants' and the Radio 4 Food Programme, is a kitchen in the Ouseburn, brought to you by The Grazer, Anna Hedworth – previously an amateur food blogger.

A space to eat, sit, rest, work and hang out. A kitchen in a shipping container, that is homely, welcoming and informal.

Explore the Ouseburn Valley

To the east of the city you will find the Ouseburn Valley, heralded by the New York Times as one of the most vibrant areas in NewcastleGateshead and once the cradle of the industrial revolution on Tyneside.

The large buildings which once housed heavy industries, manufacturers and coal companies have been regenerated and now provide studio space for artists, musicians, performers and creatives.

There are several outstanding independent pubs in Ouseburn which host live music and comedy, as well as serving locally brewed real and craft ales including The Cluny, The Free Trade Inn and The Cumberland Arms. Other venues include Northern Print, the UK's National Centre for Children's Books, Seven Stories, an urban farm and a city stables! Ouseburn has become a hub for the city's creative, artistic and digital companies.

Check out:

Ernest

Ernest is an independent and unpretentious cafe bar situated in the top end of Newcastle's creative district, the Ouseburn valley. They serve up honest food, drink, music and art – serving light bites, sandwiches and proper comfort food. Brunch is served daily from 10am – 3pm and visitors can expect fresh, seasonal dishes homemade from locally sourced produce including soups and salads. https://weareernest.com/

Kiln

Kiln is a Mediterranean bar and kitchen come pottery serving freshly prepared meals, lovingly prepared coffees and a wide selection of soft and alcoholic drinks. Dobson and Parnell

Dobson & Parnell was opened in December 2016 on the prestigious Queen Street on Newcastle's vibrant quayside. The 65-seat restaurant serves a refined British and European menu within a Victorian Grade II listed building.

Dobson & Parnell is named after two of Newcastle's Victorian architectural stalwarts, John Dobson and William Parnell, who designed the original building in 1863.

The restaurant is owned by Andy Hook, a leading restaurateur in the North East who also owns Blackfriars in Newcastle and Hinnies in Whitley Bay along with Chef Patron Troy Terrington. Use LA Taxis to pick you up when you want to return to the hotel – call the number above and quote the account number.

After dinner drink options if you fancy a night on the toon!

The Botanist

The Botanist is a bar and restaurant based in Newcastle's Monument Mall development, set across the top two floors. The unique interior features a large sycamore tree as its centre-piece and both the roof garden terrace and dining areas serve as stunning vista points for views of the city centre. Free Entry

Cementing itself as one of the UK's most prestigious galleries by hosting Turner Prize 2011 and attracting a record 150,000 visitors, BALTIC showcases the best in contemporary art from across the globe with a changing programme of events and exhibitions. It also offers stunning views of the NewcastleGateshead cityscape from the level 4 viewing platform and level 5 viewing box.

Sage Gateshead

Further along the south bank sits Sage Gateshead. It is both a live music venue and a centre for music education. It incorporates all kinds of music ranging from acoustic, indie, country, world, folk, jazz, electronic and dance to classical music, including concerts by Royal Northern Sinfonia, orchestra of Sage Gateshead.

Entry to Sage Gateshead is free but access to the concert halls is by ticket to a show or an appointment.

Wylam Brewery

Founded in 2000, Wylam is a 30 Barrel Micro Brewery that resides at the Palace of Arts in Exhibition Park. Alongside the Brewery there is a Brewery Tap, which is open to the public Thursdays to Sundays inclusive. Serving the freshest Wylam Beers on Keg and Cask, The Tap Room pours exclusive brews and blends that can only be found within its cosy confines The venue is also a great place for gigs and pop-up events.

Afternoon tea at Jesmond Dene House
